
Anchor Words: Words packed with meaning that can help create a theme.

- 1. Scan the text before reading closely. Look for **anchor words** that can help build a theme.
- 2. Read the entire text closely. Circle words that connect to anchor words.
- 3. List all circled words on a piece of paper. Write them in order of appearance on the text.
- 4. Select, reject, and modify the words as needed until they create a poem. <u>If</u> you are having trouble, return to the text for inspiration or word choices.
- 5. Try different possibilities before choosing the final option.
- 6. Return to the text and erase circles around words that you are not going to use.
- 7. Add an illustration or drawing that relates to your poem. Make sure not to draw over your poem.



- 1. Brainstorm different pictures that relate to the Revolutionary War. Draw the **silhouette** of one picture.
- 2. Scan the text within the silhouette and (using a pencil!) box in words that interest you.
- 3. List all boxed-in words on a piece of paper. Write them in order of appearance on the text.
- 4. Select, reject, and modify the words as needed until they create a poem. <u>If you are having trouble</u>, return to the text for inspiration or word choices.
- 5. Try different possibilities before choosing the final option.
- 6. Return to the text and erase circles around words that you are not going to use.
- 7. Add colors to your drawing to emphasize important ideas from your poem.
