Point Reyes National Seashore is a very special place, both to the First People and to the many visitors who come every year. However, this "protected" seashore is being ravaged by beef and dairy operations within its boundaries.

The cattle use vast amounts of water and land to graze. In return, they dump 10 million gallons of feces and urine on national parklands every year. They trample habitat, kill endangered grassland species, introduce invasive weeds, and despoil streams with fecal coliform, imperiling threatened species such as Coho salmon and California red-legged frogs, among others.

These ranches add little to the economy. "Beef and milk are overproduced in California and the United States, and both are heavily subsidized, holding prices below actual costs," says Bob Johnston, Inverness resident and retired professor of land use planning at UC Davis.

NPS has fenced the elk inside one part of the national seashore, effectively trapping when food and water grow scarce. There have been numerous deaths of elk in this area, the sole reason being they can't leave the area to forage for food and water.

Please recognize the status of PRNS as a protected area and allow this fence to be taken down so the elk can roam freely.

Alternatives A and C are unacceptable to me because they would continue to inhumanely confine the Tule Elk on Tomales Point. The Tomales Point Elk Herd should be able to freely roam about the Point Reyes National Seashore for mineral-rich forage and water. Several die-offs during recent periods of drought have reduced the Tule Elk herd from 465 to the current total of 262. The Elk should not be trapped behind an 8 foot fence and left to die of starvation and dehydration. Once the Elk fence has been removed, cattle fences should be installed that allow Elk to cross back and forth into the Wilderness Area but prevent cattle from doing so. People visit the Point Reyes National Seashore and Tomales Point to enjoy the magificant views and to see the majestic Tule Elk. People do not visit Point Reyes to view commercial cattle ranches and a landscape degraded by cows.

I have the following suggestions regarding improving visitor experiences for the Tomales Point Area Action Plan:

The Pierce Point Ranch area should be improved to include a visitor center comparable to the existing Bear Valley visitor center. Tomales Point has become a very popular destination for visitors and the parking area should be significantly enlarged in anticipation of increased use. In addition, bathrooms with running water and flush toilets should be added rather than primitive vault toilets without water. The Bay Area population will continue to increase along with tourism and the NPS should incorporate improvements to accommodate this expected increase.

The NPS should also develop more hiking trails in addition to the proposed viewpoint spur trail. Currently, there are only two heavily used trails to Tomales Point and McClures Beach. There are no maintained trails to the beaches and coves along Tomales Bay in the Wilderness Area. Day hikers and campers must make their own way to these popular beach and cove destinations, degrading the landscape with shortcuts and multiple unmaintained routes. Camping and picnicing areas should also be improved to enhance visitor enjoyment of the Tomales Point Wilderness Area.

I support the National Park Service's preferred "Alternative B" for the Tomales Point Tule Elk Reserve at Point Reyes National Seashore, to remove the fence and free the park's largest herd of Tule elk. Fences and confined animals have no place in national park units.

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I thank the National Park Service for requesting and considering public comments on this very important issue.
